Brucellosis: End it Now

Brucellosis is epidemic. It is highly contagious. There is no treatment. Infected animals must be destroyed. The disease is transmittable to humans and causes excruciating, debilitating pain. The information in this email is critical to your health, your children's health, your animals' health and possibly your entire livelihood.

If you missed the talks given in March and April of this year by Dr. Rick Kesler, DVM at annual seminars of the various state breeder organizations, this article will bring you up to speed.

The current epidemic started in Iowa when the government shut down contaminated kennels for 60 days. Rather than liquidate, the owners went underground, selling their animals at auction. They masked the diagnosis with antibiotics. The infected animals sold mainly to kennels in Kansas and Colorado.

Dr. Kessler reported he saw 390 cases in 2010, 598 cases in 2011, and as of March 8, he had already seen 1200 cases in 2013. In Minnesota this year, 247 dogs had to be destroyed in just 3 kennels.

Transmission. Brucellosis is spread by breeding and bodily fluids/secretions (like AIDS) but needs a host (a cell) to multiply because it lives IN the cell. It is in blood, semen, urine, tears, vaginal secretions, saliva, feces and afterbirth. 1cc of infected medium can infect 500 dogs. What does all of this mean? WEAR GLOVES when handling your dogs, especially at whelping time. Your equipment and your kennels can be easily disinfected to kill this bacteria on surfaces, but once it is inside a host, it cannot be killed because it lives inside the cells, not in your bloodstream. Another factor in the rapid spread of brucellosis is that many animals (and humans) can carry it without symptoms.

Possible Symptoms in Dogs

Intervertebral Disk Disease
Eye Inflammation
Swollen Lymph Nodes
Skin Disease
Brain Abscess
Red Testicles from dog licking from pain
Prolonged Discharge in female
Sterility is a RED FLAG
Sperm abnormalities (by professional testing)
Swollen testicles
Unwilling to breed
Abortions

Small litters from embryo loss/reabsorption Dead puppies with dark, rotting flesh

What we must do

- TEST, TEST, TEST at a reliable lab.
- Close your kennel to stud services unless tested by a reliable lab
- Do not buy puppies to breed from untested parents
- Ask to see the test results and only accept results if the dog's microchip # is on the report
- Test your dogs every year and before EVERY mating

Recommended Test

Dr. Kesler only recommends the PCR test at Kansas State Veterinary Diagnostic Lab (www.ksvdl.org). It is a DNA blood test that will not produce false positives. It can produce a false negative, especially if your dog has had any antibiotics within 40 days before the test. Typically the test is repeated 5-8 weeks later if the result was negative the first time, to account for incubation time after an initial exposure
